The rhythmic motion of stitching, the focus required to follow a pattern, and the tactile sensation of thread and fabric can calm racing thoughts and reduce feelings of anxiety. As a form of therapeutic art, embroidery offers a peaceful escape from daily stress, encouraging mindfulness and self-expression. It not only improves hand dexterity and concentration but also creates a sense of accomplishment and inner peace with every completed piece. Each stitch becomes a gentle reminder to slow down, breathe, and reconnect with yourself.

2. Before we begin

Here are a few friendly reminders to make your stitching experience smooth and joyful:

Gather Your Supplies - Make sure you have your fabric, thread, hoop, needle, and scissors ready. A comfy spot and good lighting help too!

Take Your Time - There's no rush in art! Enjoy every stitch and let your hands dance with the needle.

Relax & Have Fun - Embroidery is all about creativity and mindfulness. If you make a little "happy accident," just embrace it—it makes your piece unique!

Bonus Tip: Put on some music or a podcast, sip your favorite drink, and let the stitching begin!

Now, let's bring your masterpiece to life—one stitch at a time! 🃯 🧎

3. This kit includes

- A pre-printed fabric
- Embroidery hoop
- Needle
- Embroidery floss
- Embroidery scissors
- Thimble
- Needle threader
- Seam ripper

4. Preparation

- Setting Up the Hoop:

Using an embroidery hoop is simple and helps keep your fabric tight and easy to stitch.

- 1. Separate the two rings of the hoop.
- 2. Place your fabric over the smaller ring, centering your design.
- 3. Lay the larger ring on top and press it down, sandwiching the fabric between the rings.
- 4. Tighten the screw on the top of the hoop until the fabric is firm and smooth, like a drum.

This tension keeps your stitches neat and makes the embroidery process much more enjoyable!





- How to thread the needle:

Threading the needle is a simple and soothing part of the process!

- 1. Take a piece of embroidery thread already cut for you.
- 2. Hold the end of the thread between your thumb and index finger, gently pinching it so just a small tip sticks out.
- 3. Bring the eye of the needle close to the thread and carefully guide the thread through the eye.
- 4. Once it's through, pull enough thread through to create an even length.

Another way to thread the needle is using the needle threader;

- 1. Insert threader into eyehole
- 2. Hook the thread
- 3. Pull out threader
- 4. You are done!





- Position the needle:

To hold a needle for embroidery in a way that feels joyful and comfortable, imagine it as an extension of your creative energy, guiding your thread through fabric with ease and purpose.



O Grip the needle between your thumb and index finger, with the thread hanging loosely below the eye of the needle. Feel its balance, neither gripping too tightly nor too loosely, allowing it to move freely but with control.

As your fingers dance, the needle becomes a paintbrush, and every stitch is a brushstroke on the canvas of your imagination.

And you're ready to start stitching!

5. Project Instructions

To ensure your embroidery looks its best, pay attention to the order of stitches! If parts of the pattern overlap, start with the lower section first, then move on to the upper details.

Always save the **contour stitching** for after you've completed the filling for a crisp, beautiful finish. And remember, don't iron the fabric before embroidering to keep your pattern intact.

Make It Your Own!

Mix and match the colors as you like—make each blossom as unique as you are! Your creativity will bring this design to life in a way that reflects your

personal style. Let each stitch be a joyful celebration of heritage, relaxation, and self-expression...

Remember, there's no right or wrong - each stitch you make adds a personal touch to your creation. Have fun and let your imagination guide you!

Now, let's start stitching and watch your design come to life with every thread!

5. Troubleshooting Tips

Thread Tangling:

- 1. **Keep the Thread Tight**: Hold your thread tight, but not too tight, as you pull it through the fabric. Loose thread is more likely to tangle.
- 2. **Stitch Slowly**: Work slowly and pull your needle and thread through the fabric smoothly, avoiding jerky motions that can cause loops or tangles.
- 3. Check for Twists: After each stitch, let the needle dangle so the thread untwists. This will help prevent it from knotting as you continue stitching.

How to Fix Tangled Thread:

- 1. Stop as Soon as You Notice Tangling: If you feel the thread starting to tangle or loop, stop immediately and gently pull it out to avoid making it worse.
- 2. **Gently Untangle**: Use your fingers or a needle to gently untangle any knots or loops that have formed. Be patient, as yanking can tighten the knot.
- 3. Undo the Last Stitch: If the tangle has already affected your stitch, carefully pull out the last stitch or two to free the thread.

4. Cut the Thread if Necessary: If the tangle is too tight to fix, cut the thread and start again, tying off the end securely so the project isn't disrupted.

Fabric Wrinkling:

- 1. Tension Control: Be mindful of how tightly you pull your stitches. Pulling the thread too tightly can gather and distort the fabric, causing it to wrinkle. Keep your tension even and gentle.
- 2. Secure Fabric Properly in the Hoop: When placing the fabric in the hoop, make sure it's evenly stretched in all directions. Adjust the tension of the hoop if necessary, and smooth out any wrinkles before tightening the screw.
- 3. Work from the Center Out: Begin stitching from the center of your design and work outward. This ensures the fabric stays smooth, as pulling the thread outward evenly helps prevent bunching or wrinkling.

How to Fix Wrinkling During Embroidery:

 If wrinkles start to form while you're working, pause and readjust the fabric in the hoop. Smooth it out gently and ensure its taut again before continuing.

7. 🗱 You Did It! Your Embroidery is Complete! 😹

Take a moment to admire your beautiful creation—you stitched with love, patience, and creativity, and it shows! **

Before you give your masterpiece its final touch:

• Secure Your Threads - Make sure all your stitches are neatly tied off, so your design stays perfect for years to come.

- Show It Off! Frame it, turn it into a patch, or gift it to someone special. Every stitch tells a story—let yours be seen!
- Most importantly, be proud of yourself! Embroidery is more than just thread and fabric—it's a little piece of joy made with your own hands.

 Keep stitching, keep creating, and most of all, keep having fun! ** **

8. Finishing Touches

Framing to Display Your Work:

You've completed the embroidery — now it's time to give it a polished, professional look!

- 1. Center the Embroidery in the Hoop: Place the outer ring of the hoop aside and re-center your embroidery in the inner hoop (the one already holding the fabric). Ensure the design is perfectly aligned and centered as you want it to appear in the frame.
- 2. **Tighten the Hoop**: Place the **outer hoop** back over the inner hoop, making sure the fabric is taut and smooth. Adjust the fabric if necessary and tighten the screw on the hoop to secure it firmly.
- 3. Trim the Excess Fabric: Flip the hoop over and trim the excess fabric, leaving about 1-2 inches of fabric around the edge of the hoop.
- 4. Secure the Back: With the Running Stitch Method; Use a needle and thread to sew a running stitch around the excess fabric. Pull the thread tight to gather the fabric at the back of the hoop and tie it off.





5. Add Felt Backing (optional): Place the piece of felt, apply glue (or not!) around the edges and press the felt onto the back to cover the stitches.

And voilà! Your embroidery is ready to be proudly displayed, serving as a beautiful reminder of your creativity every time you see it.
